

## **Review of Pupil Premium Strategy 2022-25**

## **Pupil Premium strategy outcomes**

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupil in the academic year of 2022-23

1. Bring non-complex pupil premium children PIRA data within 10% points of nonpupil premium children in each year group

PIRA tests the pupil's reading knowledge termly and are administers to Year 1 to Year 5. This information is then used so that teachers can identify gaps within knowledge so that gaps and any misconceptions can be addressed promptly with individual children, groups or the whole class where relevant. Test outcomes are analysed closely to include pupil groups such as pupil premium and non-pupil premium. Senior Leaders meet with teachers to discuss the analysis at subject level as well as pupil level to identify and track carefully that pupils are on trajectory.

Successes include;

A systematic approach to teaching Phonics daily through RWI. This is delivered to Nursery through to Year 1 daily, to teach decoding, which resulting in 100% of Year 1 achieving the expected standard in Phonics at the end of 2023. Small group and one to one teaching was a strategy used to ensure that all Year 1 children could decode words using the 44 phonemes by the end of Year 1.

The Cusp Reading Curriculum was implemented in Year 2 to Year 6, with daily whole class reading that ensures reading for fluency as well as teaching reading for understanding. Small Group tuition was implemented focusing on Pupil Premium children across Key Stage Two. This alongside continuing to embed reading for pleasure and Reading Journals for children in Year 2 to Year 3, whereby most children now engage in a weekly response to reading home learning task has seen the amount of children reading at home positively increase as per the pupil and parent survey results.

Summer 2023 PIRA data showed that 100% of non-complex pupil premium children outperformed non-pupil premium children at the end of Year 1, 4, 5. Non-complex pupil premium children also outperformed non-pupil premium children in Year 3 and in Year 6 reading outcomes.

2. Bring non-complex pupil premium children PUMA data within 10% points of non-pupil premium children in each year group



PUMA tests the pupil's mathematical knowledge termly and are administerd to Year 1 to Year 5. This information is then used so that teachers can identify gaps within knowledge so that gaps and any misconceptions can be addressed promptly with individual children, groups or the whole class where relevant. Test outcomes are analysed closely to include pupil groups such as pupil premium and non-pupil premium. Senior Leaders meet with teachers to discuss the analysis at subject level as well as pupil level to identify and track carefully that pupils are on trajectory.

Successes include daily arithmetic, small group tutoring and a well-embedded Maths Curriculum resulting in Maths outcomes as a strength across the school.

Summer 2023 PUMA data showed that pupil premium children are outperforming non-pupil premium at the end of Year 1 and Year 3 and 100% of non-complex pupil premium children outperformed or equaled non pupil premium children in Year 4 and Year 5.

## 3. Bring pupil premium children with 1% of non-pupil premium children for attendance

During the year of 2022-23, our Attendance Lead, working closely with EWO consultancy support, ensured that Parents were clear on the expectations for all pupils to attend school. Actions including, a clear policy and rationale to attend school, with in depth analysis supported by Senior Leaders and Governors, as well as early meetings and action plans with parents to identify barriers resulted in a gap less than 1%, whereby Pupil Premium attendance ending 2022-23 was 93.4% compared to non-pupil premium children at 94.3%.

For the academic year of 2023-24, the school continue to act with urgency and rigour when evaluating attendance, supported by undertaking the United Learning Attendance Project. This remains a school improvement priority underpinned with research.

## 4. Support all pupil premium children to attendance school trips, including the Year 5 residential

As a result of careful planning, tracking and costing, all pupil premium children attended school visits during the year of 2022-23. School supplemented the cost of the Year 5 residential and the Year 6 visit to London to ensure that all children attended. We extended the breadth of enrichment for personal development across the school last year to include;

We introduced a 'Give back Project' included each class making links with an establishment in the community and planning how they can support them.

Alongside the above, our Family Liaison Officer worked on a project to support parents with uniform offering all pupil premium children free items of uniform, shoes and PE kits, as well as offering pre-loved uniform at a cost of £1 per item.
