

Review of Pupil Premium Strategy 2022-25

Pupil Premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupil in the academic year of 2024-25

1. Bring non-complex pupil premium children Reading PIRA data in-line with non-pupil premium children in each year group

PIRA tests the pupil's reading fluency and understanding termly and is administered to Year 1 to Year 5. This information is then used so that teachers can identify gaps within knowledge so that gaps and any misconceptions can be addressed promptly with individual children, groups or the whole class where relevant. Test outcomes are analysed closely to include pupil groups such as pupil premium and non-pupil premium. Senior Leaders meet with teachers to discuss the analysis at subject level as well as pupil level to identify and track carefully that pupils are on trajectory.

A systematic approach to teaching Phonics daily through Read, Write Inc ensures that all children are targeted to achieve the expected standard at Year 1. RWI is delivered to Nursery children through to Year 1 daily, to teach decoding, which resulting in 83% of Year 1 achieving the expected standard in Phonics at the end of 2025. Small group teaching and one to one teaching was the strategy used to teach all Year 1 children could decode words using the 44 phonemes by the end of Year 1.

The Cusp Reading Curriculum is fully embedded from Year 2 to Year 6, with daily whole class reading that ensures reading for fluency as well as teaching reading for understanding. Year 2 complete the RWI programme before commencing Cusp reading lessons. This, alongside continuing to embed reading for pleasure with the completion of our School Library through the Pupil Leadership Programme.

2. Bring non-complex pupil premium children Maths PUMA data in line with non-pupil premium children in each year group

PUMA tests the pupil's mathematical knowledge termly and are administered to Year 1 to Year 5. This information is then used so that teachers can identify gaps within knowledge so that gaps and any misconceptions can be addressed promptly with individual children, groups or the whole class where relevant. Test outcomes are analysed closely to include pupil groups such as pupil premium and non-pupil premium. Senior Leaders meet with teachers to discuss the analysis at subject level as well as pupil level to identify and track carefully that pupils are on trajectory.

Successes include daily arithmetic, quality first teaching and the use of collaborative learning strategies during guided practice so that pupils can support each other
